Choosing Quality Child Care

The early years are exciting times for you and your child. As a parent/guardian you want to be confident your child is in a healthy, safe, and happy environment that meets your child's social, emotional, and physical well-being needs as they learn and grow.

There are various types of child care programs, and families are encouraged to research which type of child care would meet the needs of your family. As each family is unique, this guide was created to assist in providing practical and legislative information to help you in your research for a quality child care program.



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Relationships and environment are the key to quality child care. It is these cornerstones that will build a strong foundation towards a quality child care program. Studies show that children who attend quality child care are happier, less anxious and more motivated to learn.

Child Care Programs

Within Bruce County, there are four types of child care programs for you to select from:

1 Licensed Child Care Centres and Before & After School Programs

These programs are licensed by the Ministry of Education under the Child Care and Early Years Act to ensure the programs meet specific provincial standards for the health, safety, and developmental needs of children. Licensed Child Care Centres may provide care for infant, toddler, preschool and school-aged children.

2 Licensed Home Child Care

Bruce County's Home Child Care Program is licensed by the Ministry of Education. As a Licensed Home Child Care Program, we contract individual caregivers who offer child care out of their own homes. Caregivers are screened, approved, and monitored by the Bruce County Home Child Care staff to ensure compliance with provincial requirements as well as the policies and procedures of the agency. These homes provide care for infant, toddler, preschool and school-age children.

3 Authorized Camps and Children's Recreation Programs

Authorized Camps and Children's Recreation Programs are not licensed by the Ministry of Education; however, they are HIGH FIVE accredited. HIGH FIVE is Canada's quality standard for children's recreation and sports. These programs provide care for school-aged children.

4 Unlicensed Home Child Care

Unlicensed Home Child Care Provider are not inspected by the Ministry of Education. However the Ministry of Education investigates all complaints from the public about unlicensed home child care providers who may be operating illegally.

In an Unlicensed Home Child Care Program, the provider is not allowed to care for more than 5 children, including their own children under the age of 4.

Your Guide to Finding the Right Child Care for Your Family

Finding quality child care takes time, patience and planning. A suggestion is to visit a variety of child care programs and compare. Take this booklet with you as a guide and reflect and ask the following questions to determine if this program would meet the needs of your family.

The following observations are important to consider:

Child Care Educator

- Educator knows how children grow and learn
- Educator is kind, sensitive, responsive, open and informative
- Through observation, listening, documenting and collaboration with others educator offers a stable and stimulating setting which invites children to learn and meet their developmental needs and interests
- Collaborates with parents/guardians on common goals

Child Care Environment

- Clean, safe, and secure
- Displays ideas, values, attitudes, and cultures of those using the space
- A small number of children with each adult as per the Child Care & Early Years Act requirements
- Indoor and outdoor play spaces which thrive for learning opportunities to occur
- A variety of toys and equipment available to meet the needs of the children
- A balance of activities throughout the day
- Flexible, yet offer a regular routine
- Nutritious meals and snacks
- Inclusive environment which meets the needs of all children

Making Your Final Decision

It is important to make your decision after carefully reviewing the information you have collected and based on the reactions of both you and your child to the child care programs you have visited.

Questions you may ask yourself are:

- What program best meets the needs of my child and family (i.e. quality, affordable, times of care, location of care)?

- Was my child happy and engaged during the visit to the program and would I feel comfortable leaving my child there?

- Would I be able to communicate easily and regularly with the child care program?

- Do I feel the program's policies and procedures align with my family's values and needs?

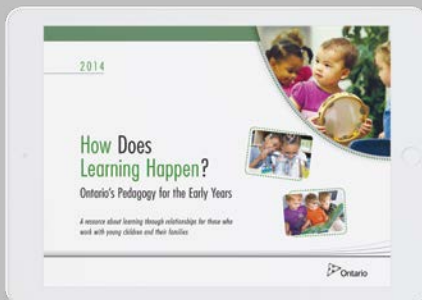
The How Does Learning Happen?

How Does Learning Happen? Guide for Parents (cont'd)

Supporting Your Child's Learning

Parents are the first teachers for their children.
Here are some ways you can support their learning:

- 1 Give your child time** and opportunity to explore at home and in your community.
- 2 Pay attention to what captures** your child's interest and attention. Ask questions or offer comments about their discoveries.
- 3 Give your child tasks** that encourage them to make discoveries or solve simple problems. For instance, a laundry basket of socks lets your child explore ways to organize, sort, match, count and practice folding and rolling up socks.
- 4 Encourage your child** to try new things and make choices.
- 5 Be aware of the sensory information** your child is receiving through noises, smells, sights and textures. Use this sensory information to talk with your child, e.g., *"Did you notice that smell? What do you think it is?"*

Finding Quality Programs

Licensed child care programs must meet and maintain provincial standards set out in the Child Care & Early Years Act. Provincial standards provide for the health, safety and well-being of children.

CHILD CARE OPTIONS

1 Child Care Programs (Licensed)

offer part-time and full-time care for infants, toddlers, preschool and school-aged children at a variety of locations.

2 Nursery School Programs (Licensed)

offer part-time preschool programs for children ages 18 months to five years at a variety of locations.

3 Bruce County Home Child Care Program (Licensed)

contracts and supports local individuals who provide child care out of their home. Part-time, full-time and extended care for infants, toddlers, preschool and school-aged children may be available.
